

Mission To Norway... with Love from Jay & Zina Herman

In August I (Zina) got an email from Masha, my former leader from Moldova. She wanted to put together a team for a week-long trip to Oslo, Norway to see what it may look like to launch a Cru movement there. Masha has a twin sister who has lived in Norway for the past 16 years and as Masha has been visiting her every year, she has fallen in love with the country and the culture. She also noticed that there are very few churches and organizations that are focused on ministering to students. So after years of prayer, she decided to gather a team which would explore the campuses in Oslo to learn what are the students perspective on world and life and see if God can use Cru to fill their needs.

With my previous experience of doing these types of trips all across Europe. I felt God encouraging me to help on this trip too. In the week we were there we met with a church pastor, a leader of a student organization, and other people who shared about Norwegian culture and wisdom with us. We spent time on two universities in Oslo and surveyed 98 students. For the first few days we asked more general questions so we could understand what needs students have, what an organization serving students should look like. Then on the last day we asked deeper and more personal questions to find those who are spiritually open.

Our overall observation was that Norwegian students don't have a lot of physical needs, but they do struggle with loneliness and some of them don't know much about Christianity. The students that are Christian need discipleship, and most of them hide the fact that they are Christians. So we learned a lot about campus life, and where and how there are ministry opportunities. As a team, there were 4 Moldovan students with us, and for 3 of



them it was their first mission trip. They were really encouraged by their time and how God used them. And for me personally, seeing the spiritual needs & blindness of students there motivated me to pray even more for new disciples and look for opportunities to have spiritual

conversations with people around us. Pray for Masha to understand God's leading about moving to Norway and starting a movement among students there. Also pray that she will be able to find a small team committed to join her for 1-3 years if God will open a door for her to go there. Pray for this week, as we have some friends visiting to join us in ministry. Pray for



opportunities for them to be a light and encouragement to people here. **Pray** for a MyFriends training we have planned this month for staff from Hungary. Pray that God will speak to them and encourage them in new ways to engage with the lost around them.

Veterans Matter... Shawn Dowling was unable to give the scheduled temple talk due to a fall and breaking her ankle. Veterans Matter is a Toledo based nonprofit that in cooperation with the Veterans Administration's housing assistance program provides the security deposit for veterans who have applied for and met the criteria for VA assistance. The program grew from two Toledo veterans who had met all of the requirements to move into an apartment but did not have funds for the security deposit. The program has grown from local to a nationwide agency. Since 2012 they have helped 10,600 veterans and 15,406 veterans and their families to obtain housing. This total includes 3,588 children. The agency is finalizing arrangements to partner with the Stephen Siller Tunnels to Towers Foundation based in New York.

Board of Education - Submitted by Jayne Klett (Board Chair Needed) Jaycie Marquardt and Breanna Simkus have perfect attendance. Three youths participated in Youth Sunday. Dave and Jean Weitelmann are teaching the Elementary class in October. Jean Weng is the substitute teacher for PreSchool. Ten fleece blankets, made by the youth, have been donated to Bethlehem Monthly Giveaways. Grape Jam sales so far have earned \$107 for Operation Oreo. The Noisy Offering for Operation Oreo is scheduled for Nov. 10 in recognition of Veterans Day. Mary Schlievert is coordinating the Christmas program, slated for

December 22nd. Board of Education Steve Blausey gave a Parsonage Progress report stating that there are just a few items to wrap up, but it is very close to being ready to put on the market. A BIBLE STUDY ABOUT JOB AND HUMAN SUFFERING

About this Month's Bible Study. The topic for this month's Bible Study is Job, an Old Testament character whose faith in God was tested in the most extreme ways possible after Satan challenged the depth of his faithfulness. We don't know whether Job was a real person or a literary creation whose purpose was to teach us about human suffering and how to know God better. Gary Anderson




The Story of Job begins by introducing Job as a "blameless and upright man, who feared God and turned away from evil." Job had "seven sons and three daughters;" he had become a man of immense wealth. The Bible tells us that Job was the "greatest of all the people of the east," (v. 1:3).

The Story of Job began with a discussion that took place in God's heavenly court. The Hebrew text says that the "sons of God presented themselves before the Lord, and the Satan came with them." God was surrounded by a full cast of figures that have variously been described as angels or heavenly beings. Indeed, there are several places in the Old Testament that envision God being surrounded by a court of spiritual beings (i.e., Gen. 1:26, IK 22:19, Dan 4:11, Ps. 29:1, etc.). The Satan who appears here, is not the devil, who is the personification of evil. In Hebrew, "Satan" means "adversary" or "accuser." Satan in the Job Story is a member of God's court and should be understood as fulfilling the role of a prosecuting attorney.

Job 1:8-12a - The Prosecutor's Case

The LORD said to Satan, "Have you considered my servant Job? There is no one like him on the earth, a blameless and upright man who fears God and turns away from evil." Then Satan answered the LORD, "Does Job fear God for nothing? Have you not put a fence around him and his house and all that he has on every side? You have blessed the work of his hands, and his possessions have increased in the land. But stretch out your hand now, and touch all that he has, and he will curse you to your face." The LORD said to Satan, "Very well, all that he has is in your power..."

where everyone present can think and speak freely. After God lavished praise on Job, Satan challenged him by saying Job feared God because God "*blessed the work of his hands*." Satan went on to argue that if Job suffers great loss ("touch all that he has"), he will "curse you to your face." God is so confident of Job's continued loyalty that he told Satan to go ahead and put Job to the test, "all that he has in in your power."

The beginning of this story surely causes us to ask, "would God whom we know as a merciful, loving God, really do that to someone who loved him?" We may begin to answer that question by recognizing that we live in a world where suffering, sometimes great suffering, is real. The suffering and death of a loved one, a great climate disaster that destroys peoples' homes, physical ailments that cause great pain and suffering, the utter destruction of war, whole populations that do not have enough food to eat. This means the Story of Job is also a story for our time. How can we sustain our faith in God in a world where human suffering is real?



Job 2:9-10 – Job's Suffering Intensifies but He Remains Steadfast

Then (Job's) wife said to him, "Do you persist in your integrity? Curse God and die!" But he said to her, "You talk like a foolish woman. Shall we receive good from God, and not accept evil?" In all this Job did not sin with his lips.

Job's calamities began when his children were killed, and his house and belongings were destroyed. Job was subsequently attacked by a plague of "*loathesome sores*." Through all this suffering, Job did not sin or accuse God of wrongdoing, "*in all this, Job did not sin with his lips*," he did not curse God. At the end of Chapter 2, we are introduced to Job's three friends: "*They met together to go and console and comfort him*." In the next 35 chapters, there are long cycles of dialogues between Job and his friends. Job's friends tried to convince him that God was punishing him because he had sinned. They argued that Job must repent and then God "*will restore to you your rightful place*" (v 8:6). Through all these accusations, Job continued to maintain his innocence, but he became convinced that God was attacking him: "*he set me up as his target; his archers surround me*" (v.16:12-13).

Job 38:1-41:24 – After Myriad Discussions, God Answered Job

Then the LORD answered Job out of the whirlwind: "Who is this that darkens counsel by <u>words without</u> <u>knowledge</u>?... I will question you, and you shall declare to me. "<u>Where were you when I laid the foundation of the</u> <u>earth</u>? Tell me, if you have understanding. Who determined its measurements—surely you know! Or who stretched the line upon it? On what were its bases sunk, or who laid its cornerstone when the morning stars sang together, and all the heavenly beings shouted for joy?



This line drawing titled "Job's New Prosperity" appears in the Haar Family Bible at the end of the Book of Job. It illustrates Job's restoration to wealth and a full family life at the conclusion of the Job Story (v. 42:12) (published in Germany in 1877).

But then after Job's incredible suffering and his so-called friends trying everything they could think of to get him to confess his wrongdoing, God (Yahweh) spoke to Job. God's discourse to Job in Chapters 38-41 has been praised as "a work of genius unequaled in world literature." What would you say if God asked you, "Where were you when I laid the foundation of the earth?" Job's sin was in trying to define an undefinable God. This can be our sin too. In this magnificent and powerful example of Hebrew poetry, God helped Job understand how little of God's creation and purpose we humans understand.

Job 42: 5, 6, 12 – Job is Reconciled with God

The Story of Job is great literature, but it is more than that. <u>Job helps us understand how</u> <u>suffering is real and how much we do not understand about God's creation</u>.
